





At the heart of the Cairngorms National Park, this valley of the River Spey, with its ancient pine forests and the highest mountain range in Britain, is a very special place. It boasts some of Scotland finest attractions, a great range of outdoor activities, and exceptional wildlife.

Attractions include a funicular railway that climbs almost to the summit of Cairn Gorm, the Highlands' main folk museum, an

out-standing steam railway, and an award winning forest adventure park. Nowhere else in Scotland will you find so many activities on



offer, from great golf courses and fishing on the famous River Spey, to excellent mountain biking, whitewater rafting and river tubing. CairnGorm Mountain is also well known as Scotland's top winter sports resort.

The Cairngorms are rich in wildlife with the old Caledonian pine forests being one of the best places in Britain to see the rare red squirrel, capercaillie, crested tit and Scottish crossbill. Ospreys are often seen fishing on the lochs and rivers.

# A great range of attractions from historic sites to family fun

### **Castles and Historic Sites**

There is huge choice of historic attractions in and around the national park. Just to the north are the fairy tale castle of Cawdor, magnificent Fort George and the famous battlefield of Culloden. To the east, within easy reach are the splendid castles of Aberdeenshire including Crathes and Balmoral.





### **Family Fun**

Family attractions are a feature of this area, with the ever-popular Landmark Park at Carrbridge a great day out – as is the Highland Wildlife Park at Kincraig.

### **Highland Folk**

You can immerse yourself in the past at the Highland Folk Museum, on of the best museums of its kind in Britain, with an authentic 18th century township and a rich collection from across the Highlands.



The Strathspey Railway captures the atmosphere of an old Scottish branch line and has fine views of the Cairngorms, the setting for Britain's highest funicular railway

### **Sandy Beaches**

Nowhere else in-land has such a great sandy beach. Loch Morlich with its wide stretch of sand beside old Caledonian pine trees is the place to be on a hot sunny day.

On the coast, a short drive away, are more superb beaches including Nairn, Findhorn, Hopeman and Lossiemouth.



### **Whisky Distilleries**

There is no shortage of malt whisky distilleries with easy reach. From Dalwhinnie, one of the highest distilleries in Scotland, to Speyside, the heartland of malt whisky distilling in Scotland, you can enjoy a dram and discover what is so special about these Highland malts.



## Things to do

Nowhere else in Scotland has so many activity options

### **Great Golf Courses**

The valley of the River Spey has some of the best heathland courses in Britain with Boat of Garten and Aviemore's Spey Valley course being outstanding. The superb links courses of Nairn Dunbar and Castle Stuart are no distance away.



A mecca for anglers, this beautiful area offers excellent salmon fishing on the River Spey, and good loch fishing for both trout and pike.





### **Mountain Biking**

This has to Scotland's best area for mountain biking with superb tracks through the forests of Glenmore and Rothiemurchus and the dedicated mountain bike centre Wolftrax at Laggan.

### **Adventure**

There are plenty of operators offering courses and organised experiences in everything from winter survival to white water rafting, tubing, canoeing and rock climbing.



Newtonmore is where pony trekking in Scotland began and the area continues to offer a good choice of horse riding.

### **Walking**

With woodland trails around Rothiemurchus and Glenmore, plus the scale and variety of the routes in the Cairngorms themselves, this is peerless walking country.





### **Snowsports**

CairnGorm Mountain is Scotland's premier ski resort with a wide range of runs to suit all abilities. Lecht 2090 also offer good skiing with 20 different runs.

### **Other Sports**

Other activities include clay pigeon shooting at Rothiemurchus, off-road driving on Rothiemurchus and Alvie estates, plus watersports at Loch Insh and Loch Morlich.

### **Eating Out**

No where else in the Highlands has such a variety of great places to eat, from award winning restaurants, to riverside pubs, cosy cafes and classy cake shops, plus such a choice of cuisines: Scottish; Italian; French; Indian and Chinese.

### **Dinner on Rails**

Dine on a train as it used to be while watching a changing panorama of the Cairngorm mountains. Enjoy a traditional Sunday lunch on the Strathspey Clansman from March to October or board the Strathspey Highlander for dinner between June 1st and August 31st.





### **Britain's Highest Restaurant**

In a spectacular setting, 1097m above sea level, Cairngorm Mountain's

Ptarmigan Restaurant may not be the best place to see a ptarmigan but it offers an excellent menu throughout the day.

### **Cakes and Squirrels**

Try the Potting Shed Tearoom at Inshriach Nursery with its wildlife viewing gallery for the most delicious of cakes and the closest views of red squirrels. There is no shortage of choice here with a strong programme of traditional and unusual of events throughout the year.

### **Sled Dogs**

The biggest event in Britain's sled dog racing calendar takes place in Glenmore Forest when 1,000 dogs and 250 mushers race along the trails around Loch Morlich.



Three major events take place during the first two weeks in August, the Grantown Show and highland games at Newtonmore and Nethy Bridge.





### **Steam Fair**

For the largest gathering of steam traction engines in the North of Scotland plus a steam fairground organ, Boat of Garten is the place to go.

### **Chainsaw Carving**

Be amazed at the spectacular sculptures that can be created with a chainsaw at Carve Carrbridge, the national chainsaw carving competition

### **Thunder in the Glens**

Even if you do not own a motorbike – the UK's largest Harley Davidson rally is a memorable and highly enjoyable event.



## **Local Wildlife**

Many excellent wildlife watching experiences

### Crested tits and crossbills

If you are hankering after some Strathspey specials, such as crested tit and Scottish crossbill, then try the trails network on the Rothiemurchus Estate. Go the estate's trout fishery, close to the bridge over the Spey at Aviemore, to see ospreys trying for fast-food take-aways in summer.

### **Year-round reindeer**

Get the low-down on reindeer at the Cairngorm Reindeer Centre then go on a guided walk to meet some of the herd. Further up from the Cairngorm

car park there are paths into the Northern Corries where you have every chance of seeing ptarmigan.



### The original ospreys



The osprey eyrie you can see from the Loch Garten Osprey Centre in Abernethy Forest is perhaps the world's best watched nest. Ospreys have bred here since 1958. At the centre, attractions in addition to the

> star fish-hawk turn (viewable through telescopes and video link) include siskin, great-spotted woodpecker and red squirrel.

There's a dawn watch here for capercaillie at a nearby lek in early summer.

### **Magnificent marshes**

A huge wetland, thick with floating beds of sedges and other water plants, might seem tricky to visit. But if you use marked trails to the two hides at the Insh Marshes you'll get a good idea of one of the riverside marvels of the Spey. Watch for breeding waders such as lapwing, redshank, curlew and snipe and listen for water rail.




## **Local History**

A cross roads of the Highlands with a fascinating past

### **Garrisoned with Troops**

A wild and lawless part of the United Kingdom in the 1700s the Highlands were garrisoned with troops. Prominent buildings of this period are Ruthven Barracks near Kingussie built in 1719, the attractive old castle of

Corgarff, and the massive Fort George.



### **River Highway**

Like the A9 road today, the River
Spey was once the main highway for
moving timber out of the valley. Logs
and rafts of sawn timber were floated
down to the shipyards and sawmills
at the river mouth. There is no trace
today of these shipyards but you can
still see the remains of dams used
during these log floating days to raise
the levels of Loch Morlich, Loch an
Eilean and Loch Einich.

### **Boats and Bridges**

The River Spey, with no bridges, and just ferries known as 'boats', was once a major barrier. One of the first bridges across the river is the Old Spey Bridge built in 1754 to carry the military road from Braemar to Fort George. The packhorse Bridge of Carr, 1717, is the oldest, while the most spectacular is Dulsie Bridge built in 1755 across a deep gorge on the River Findhorn.





### **Trains and Tourism**

The completion of the railway linking Perth to Inverness via the Pass of Drumochter in 1863 helped put the valley on the map and led to the development of many of its towns and villages. For a flavour of these early railway days visit the stations of Aviemore and Boat of Garten and take a trip on the Strathspey Steam Railway.

### **Townships and Towns**

There were no towns or villages here until the end of the 18th century. Before that people lived in small groups of heather thatched houses or townships like that at the Highland Folk Museum at Newtonmore. The first town to be built here was Grantown on Spey, it was founded in 1765 by Sir James Grant of Grant. Its interesting story is told in the Grantown Museum.
